Preparation for the Consecration to the Holy Family

Dearest Heavenly Father, Father of mercies, your Only Begotten Son, as He hung upon the Cross, chose the Blessed Virgin Mary, His Mother, to be our Mother also. Grant, we pray, that with her loving help, and that of her most chaste spouse, Saint Joseph, we may humbly and prayerfully prepare ourselves as the parish of St. Vincent de Paul, for consecration to the Holy Family. We humbly make our prayer in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. Amen.

Let us prepare for the Parish's Consecration to the Holy Family.

This will take place in the following way:

2. Attend Holy Mass every Sunday and on Holy Days of Obligation.

The novena of prayers for the renewal of the parish consecration is underway. The consecration will take place on the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph,

December 31 & January 1, during all Holy Masses. The Consecration to the Holy Family is a Knights of Columbus Faith in Action Program.

Gospel for Sunday November 6

Luke 20:27-38



Jesus answers a question from some Sadducees about the resurrection of the dead. In today's Gospel, we hear about an encounter between Jesus and some Sadducees.

The Sadducees are described in this Gospel as opponents to the belief in resurrection. In the dialogue presented here, we see an example of the means of disputation that was common in first century Judaism. The Sadducees use the example of Levirate marriage, found in the Law of Moses, to disprove belief in the resurrection. If a man died without producing an heir, the man's brother should marry his wife and the offspring of this union would inherit the property and carry on the name of the man who had died. The Sadducees use this as an example to challenge belief in the resurrection.

Jesus argues from the same written Law of Moses to show that there is resurrection. Using the texts from the Book of Exodus (**Chapter 3**) that describe Moses' encounter with God in the burning bush, Jesus shows that God is the God of the living, not the dead. Here Jesus uses the same method and texts of the Sadducees to counter them. As the Gospel text suggests, he beat them at their own game!

More importantly, in this discourse Jesus shows the limits of our imaginations when it comes to eternal life. The Sadducees argued against resurrection because of the limits of earthly existence. They did not imagine another possibility for existence and relationship with God. Jesus proposes that the possibilities of resurrected life are beyond our imaginations. Jesus' conclusion suggests something else as well: To spend time worrying about resurrected life is to miss the point. The point is eternal relationship with God is possible, for God is the God of the living, ". . . for to him all are alive."

"I am fearfully, wonderfully made" – The Unborn

Each precious unborn in the mother's womb proclaims through the Holy Spirit of God, "I give you thanks that I am fearfully and wonderfully made," and "truly you have formed my inmost being -- you knit me in my mother's womb." Psalm 139

That the precious unborn children of God are truly human beings, persons, has been our Catholic belief for ages and recently scientific technology has over and over confirmed our belief that a new human being begins at conception.

We rejoice with gratitude to God that the Supreme Court has overturned Roe v Wade and in so doing, has implicitly recognized that the unborn are persons. In doing away with Roe v Wade, the Court has acted on the condition of the decision in 1973. We remember what the court admitted in that decision, "if...personhood (for the unborn) is established the appellant case of course collapses for the fetus right to life is then guaranteed by the 14th amendment." The appellant case has collapsed! We are now experiencing a truly historic victory for human life. Medical science over and over in recent years recognizes that there is a new human being in the very act of conception which has always been our biblical belief.

Never once has the Supreme Court declared abortion as a constitutional right nor as a human right as some falsely claim. Human rights are given to us in our human nature by our creator and no government can take away these rights. Hence, as we move into the future after Roe v Wade, governments, and courts at a national and state level must respect and protect the tiny unborn persons made in God's image and they must never be deprived of life and liberty. The 14th amendment clearly states: "nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty, and property...nor deny any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the law". This respect and love for the dignity for human life must be shown to each person from the womb to the tomb.

So, as abortion continues to be discussed and debated, personhood of the unborn is the compelling issue. All pro-lifers must strongly and clearly preach and protect this fundamental life issue of the sacredness of personhood. Governments exist to protect God-given inalienable rights, the first of which is the right to life. Flowing from our belief and scientific evidence, both Pope St. John Paul II and Pope Francis have clearly stated that we must have great love and support for each new child of God and the mother. Both Popes have stated that abortion is murder and Pope Francis compares abortion to the hiring of a hitman to kill an innocent human being.
